Ministers Musings "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. ... The zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this."

(Isaiah 9:6 a; 7; NIV)

We have entered the Advent Season, once again, with all its joys and hustle and bustle.

We have a lot to do and a lot to plan during this period of time.

We decorate and clean; we bake, shop, and plan on giving gifts to family and friends.

We plan for Christmas lunches and suppers, and we invite or visit with loved ones.

We might also remember someone beloved, who is not with us any longer.

In all this busyness of the Season that **we** are involved in, I would like to draw your attention to the Good News, which is at the heart of Christmas: it is **the Lord Almighty**, who accomplished and prepared for us the reason why we can celebrate.

We give because we have been given. We do our preparations because God had prepared the greatest gift to us: the Holy Child, who is called Jesus. Marion Brown asked me today if I would read the scriptures on two consecutive Sundays in January. She explained that it was difficult to get volunteers to fulfil that task.

Surely, I thought, there must be lots of capable folks who could do this. So why aren't you stepping up?

I can tell you what steps I take to prepare to read those sometimes-convoluted scripture passages. They might be helpful.

1. Understand all the word meanings and pronunciations contained therein. The Internet has plenty of helpful sites. Sometimes there is a conflict, and I may need to ask the minister which is preferable.

2. Understand as best I can the ideas being presented. Again, there are several internet biblical sources to help with interpretation.

3. Read each sentence and make a slash indicating a pause;/ two slashes for a longer pause.// Mark the **key words** to be stressed.// It makes a world of difference, (e.g. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=6gZtW-</u>

<u>U6qG4</u>) Dame Judy Dench to King Charles in a short comedy sketch interpreting the famous line from Hamlet.)

See that the sentences flow and have a rhythm as if I were speaking them.

4. Practice.

5. Reading to the Congregation: I find an attentive face at the rear and begin. I read at a controlled pace. Rapid fire doesn't work with older folks with hearing aids. Pausing is helpful. Be careful to avoid dying off at the end of a sentence.

Eye contact is crucial. That's why it's important to practise so I have a moment to look at the audience while completing a sentence. Losing one's place can be overcome by using a finger to mark the line. If I do get lost the pause is not the end of the world. I try to convey the writer's message as if it were mine.

I need to remember to repeat the customary closing phrase .

So yes, it does take time, but why not give it a go? Perhaps you may have doubts about the Youtube recording. I never give it a thought; it's not as if we're ready to take on TikTok.

And yes, I realize I have read orally to classes for forty-some years and I should be able to do it in my sleep. But if you were willing to try the above you too could experience the tingle of excitement just prior to the call and also enjoy the satisfaction of having made a small contribution to congregational enlightenment.

A. We have received the quote for the window which is \$2468.53 and will be ready in 6 weeks. The quote for the vent window would double the cost of the window so we will look at another solution with Maria for ventilation and cooling in the office.

B. The alarm system has been working and the company in charge of it had check and tested said all was working.

C. We have the partitions in the church for the corner SW room in the basement to be placed as needed.

D. The heat cord has been replaced back onto the shingle by Gene and we also turned on the heat tape for the winter.

E. The back splash in the kitchen will need to be reglued and place back onto the wall.

F. John has the plans for making the Banner hangers for the closet and will complete them when time allows.

G. The wheelchair accessible sidewalk approach will be looked at again in the spring.

NEW BUSINESS

A. Remote Ceiling Fan in sanctuary front fan not working. Not working for a few years.

1. We will have to get some scaffolding to reach up to change the remote system in the ceiling fan.

2. We will also get a new bulb for the projector and service it as well.

B. Make shelves in corner counting room for Rock of Ages music equipment when putting banner hanger in place.

1. We have discussed putting shelves in the corner room in the sanctuary to store the music equipment. It is better to just purchase the metal shelves from a store and put them in. Don talked to Pastor John of the Rock of Ages church about them purchasing the shelves and he said it would be better for us to because if they leave, they may not have any need for them.

2. We will look into purchasing metal shelving to hold the music equipment and remove the counting desk from the room.

3. We will also be getting the Banner hangers made and installed this winter.

Property team continued :

• C. Outside water shut off valve should be replaced with a new ball valve type.

1. We discussed on changing the outside water shut off valve which is very hard to turn for closing and opening to a ball valve type. Will look in to replacing the valve soon.

D. The sink light upstairs in the library needs to be replace due to very hard to turn on.

1. Robert will investigate purchasing a new light.

2. New light has been purchased and installed for over the sink in Library.

E. Need to look at moving the thermostat out of the library into the inside wall of the Sanctuary for better heat control.

1. Need to look at the toys and puzzle area in library for a more organized clean up when children are finished playing after service. We are investigating.

Session 1 | Genesis 1:26–31: Caretakers of Creation

Then God said, "Let us make humans in our image, according to our likeness, and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over the cattle and over all the wild animals of the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth." So God created humans in his image,

in the image of God he created them;

male and female he created them.

God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth and to every bird of the air and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

1. From the beginning, our identity as human beings has been rooted in being stewards of Creation. Yet, we've struggled with the concept of having "dominion" over it (other translations say "take charge" or "be responsible for"). We remember, though, that we're created in God's own image. What kind of a caretaker is God? If we are like God, what kind of stewards should we be?

2. In the other Creation account, we hear that God placed the man in the garden to till and keep it (Gen. 2:15). Have you ever kept a garden? What are some of the joys and challenges?

3. When you think of your community of faith, surrounding neighbourhood, and wider world, what is yours to tend together? What and who are you responsible for? How might you help these aspects of Creation to grow and flourish? Prayer: Creator God, thank you for making us in your image—creative, generous, and caring. Stir in us joy and compassion as we live into our calling as stewards—nurturing your good Creation together. Amen **Submitted by Laura J.**



The church office is open 9am to—12 noon Wednesdays and Thursdays. Feel free to drop in or contact Susan B. during that time.




